PRESIDENT'S LETTER...Jon Boss '54



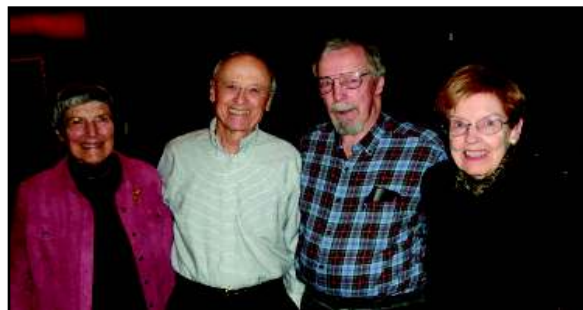
